Open to residents of Richland County. Judged on Friday. All exhibits must have been produced by the exhibitor during the exhibit year. Not more than one entry is allowed by any farm or any one exhibitor. Please follow instructions as to size of sheaves, slabs, etc., as this will be considered in judging.

GRAINS – Grain will be judged on uniformity of kernel, soundness, percent of foreign matter, weight per bushel, and percent of damaged grain. One peck to be exhibited in neat, clean containers.

SHEAF EXHIBITS – Sheaf exhibits should be securely tied in attractive bundles. Sheaf exhibits of grain should be 2 inches in diameter at middle band and shall be dried throughout. Leaves should be removed from sheaf of small grains. Hay sheaves shall be at least 5 inches in diameter. Samples should be selected when in right stage for good hay, cured throughout leaves left on and as green cured as possible.

FORAGE – Display to be a slab approximately 6 inches thick, wrapped neatly in a clear plastic bag. Unwrapped slabs will not be accepted.

- **No rabbits with babies** are permitted.
- **Only rabbits entered** in the fair are permitted on the fairgrounds.
- **Cages, water and feed dishes** will be provided. **Exhibitor must bring feed and is responsible for daily care for their animals. Failure to provide adequate daily care will result in dismissal.**
- **When transporting animals into the fair**, all cages **MUST** be clean. Any questionable cages will be addressed at time of check-in and exhibit will be dismissed from the fairgrounds. There will be no additional check-in times and entry fee paid will not be reimbursed, so be sure to clean cages ahead of time.

Meat Pen – consist of 3 rabbits. All rabbits shall be of the same breed and variety (not necessarily purebreds). No rabbit may be over 10 weeks of age and 3.5 to 5.5 pounds. These rabbits may not be entered in any other classes.

Roaster Rabbit – single rabbit, either sex, must be under 6 months of age and 5.5 to 9 pounds in weight, may not be entered in any other classes.

Single Fryer – not over 10 weeks of age and 3.5 to 5.5 pounds, may not be entered in any other classes.
